## AVALANCHE INVOLVEMENT REPORTS

The Avalanche Research Centre of the National Research Council continues to collect information about all encounters of persons, equipment, and structures with avalanches in Canada. The objective is to obtain statistics about the extent and type of avalanche problems in Canada. Summaries of the data draw attention to avalanche dangers and make management personnel of governments and industry aware of the need for safety and control measures. Although fatal accidents receive most attention and make the media, it is equally important to know the number of close calls and the circumstances of lucky escapes. Summaries of avalanche involvements are published annually in the June issue of Avalanche News. A summary of the involvements 1969-1987 was printed in the Canadian Alpine Journal, Vol. 71, 1988.

The collection of information on avalanche involvements requires the cooperation of everyone in the avalanche business and those travelling in terrain subject to avalanches. We wish to request that anybody who has been involved with an avalanche, or has witnessed or heard about an avalanche encounter, transmit the information in writing or by word of mouth to the Avalanche Resource Centre of the National Research Council of Canada. A short form has been designed for this purpose and is attached to this issue of Avalanche News. The form, together with explanations on how to fill it out, was also printed in the Guidelines for Weather, Snowpack, and Avalanche Observations. For reporting an involvement, detach the form or copy it. You may request additional copies - simply write down the information on a piece of paper and submit it, telephone, or mention it during a conversation. The message is important, but not the format.

No names need to be mentioned, not even the location needs to be specific. All the information is kept confidential and will be released in summary form only.

## TRAINING VIDEOS

The Canadian Avalanche Association has produced video tapes as training aids. The videos provide valuable assistance in courses by summarizing and illustrating selected topics. Avalanche safety operations (for example, skiers, roads, heliskiing) will find them useful as refreshers of the techniques for staff training.

Presently the following tapes are available:

1. Avalanche Terrain (Length: 9 minutes)

The video depicts, with the aid of still pictures, the features of terrain that favour the start and motion of avalanches. Safe routes for travel and protected areas on roads are explained.

2. Snow Profile Procedure (Length: 9 minutes 30 seconds)

The techniques for the observation of snow profiles are illustrated with the aid of still pictures. The techniques are those described in the Guidelines for Weather, Snowpack, and Avalanche Observations.

Extreme Avalanche Run-out: Data From Four Mountain Ranges.  
Reprint from Annals of Glaciology 13, 1989. Publication NRCC 31059.

Abstract by Authors:

Avalanche run-out distances have a prominent statistical character which is not usually featured in calculations

derived from avalanche dynamics models. In order to predict run-out distances in a rational manner, the statistical element should be included. Here, we present and analyze data on extreme run-out from four mountain ranges. When the data are fitted to extreme-value distributions, we are able to show how (and why) extreme-value parameters vary with terrain properties of the different ranges.

The Avalanche Hazard Index.

Reprint from Annals of Glaciology 13, 1989. Publication NRCC 31060.

Abstract by the Author:

The avalanche-hazard index is a numerical expression of damage and loss, as the result of an interaction between snow avalanches and vehicles on a road. The index is determined by multiplying the frequencies of moving and waiting vehicles being hit by various types of avalanches by a weighting which indicates the severity of the consequences. The avalanche-hazard index has proved to be a useful decision-making tool for identification of those avalanche paths where control would be most beneficial, for evaluation of options for control measures, and for comparison of the risks for different roads.
